




All rooms come equipped with in room coffee makers, iron, ironing board, hair dryers, high speed internet access, cable TV, pay per view movies, and voice mail.

On September 2, 1945 the documents of surrender officially ending World War II were signed by the Japanese and designated representatives of allied nations. General Douglas MacArthur officiated the ceremony aboard the USS *Missouri* and was the last to sign on behalf of the United States.

MacArthur, flanked by his military colleagues, took his Parker fountain pen and simply signed his first name "Douglas." He then passed the pen to General Wainwright, who signed "Mac." MacArthur then handed the pen to General Percival, who signed "Arthur."

This unusual procedure was MacArthur's way of honoring the two United States generals who had suffered severe persecution as prisoners of war. They had persevered, and now they were allowed to share in the glory of victory.

In Romans 8:17 Paul describes the future of those who persevere in the spiritual battles we fight this side of heaven. He calls them joint-heirs. Those who share in the sufferings of Christ will also share in his glory.





The Hotel del Coronado is a world famous Victorian resort on Coronado Island located just across the bay from downtown. The wide sandy expanse in front of the hotel is routinely named



one of the top beaches in the country. It is always recommed to arrive early in the day for the best spot on the beach and to beat the crowds. Probably best known for the movie, "Some Like It Hot", staring Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon, the lower-level is filled with memorabilia from Charles Lindbergh, Marilyn Monroe, Charlie Chaplin and many other famous hotel guests. With over 115 years of history, you will want to take part in one of the daily tours offered in this magnificent palace, but listen up for the ghost of Kate Morgan. Her story is part of the great mistec that makes up the grand Hotel del Coronado.


the harbor. Or simply take a stroll past the ponds, graceful fountains, lush gardens and take in the lush landscaping

Cabrillo National Monument was created by presidential proclamation signed by Woodrow Wilson on October

14, 1913. The monument was established to commemorate the voyage and discoveries of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo in 1542-1543. Cabrillo and his men were the first Europeans to explore San Diego Bay and what is now the West Coast of the United States. Individuals, ships, or units from all United States of Allied branches of service that served in the Pacific during WWII are honored on the Memorial Wall.



USS New York LPD - 21



Ships Motto "Never Forget"

On 7 September 2002 in a ceremony aboard *USS Intrepid* in New York City, then Secretary of the Navy Gordon England announced the decision to name the fifth amphibious transport dock ship of the San Antonio class, *New York* (LPD 21). Secretary England said, "This new class of ships will project American power to the far corners of the Earth and support the cause of freedom well into the 21st century. From the war for independence through the war on terrorism, which we wage today, the courage and heroism of the people of New York has been an inspiration. *USS New York* will play an important role in our Navy's future and will be a fitting tribute to the people of the Empire State."

Governor George Pataki, Governor of New York, responded by stating, "On September 2001, our nation's enemies brought their fight to New York... The *USS New York* will now bring the fight to our nation's enemies well into the future."

Steel from the World Trade Center was melted down in a foundry in Amite, La., to cast the ship's bow section. When it was poured into the molds on Sept. 9, 2003, "those big rough steelworkers treated it with total reverence," recalled Navy Capt. Kevin Wensing, who was there. "It was a spiritual moment for everybody there."

Construction of the USS New York is being done by Northrup Grummon near New Orleans, La. She is currently scheduled to be commissioned in New York city sometime in 2009 before being homeported in Norfolk, VA.



The Flag of The United States of American

The 21-Gun Salute stands for the sum of the numbers in the year 1776

When folding the flag, the Honor Guard meticulously folds the flag 13 times.

The **First** fold is a symbol of Life

The **Second** fold is a symbol or he belief in the eternal life

The **Third** fold is made in honor and remembrance of the Veterans departing the ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of the country to attain piece throughout the world

The **Fourth** fold represents the weaker nature, for as American Citizens trusting in God, it is to him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war for His devine guidance.

The **Fifth** fold is a tribute to the country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right; but it is still our country, Right or Wrong."

The **Sixth** fold is for where people's hearts lie. It is with their heart that They pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

The **Seventh** fold is a tribute to its Armed Forces, for it is thought the Armed Forces that they protect their country and their flag against all enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of their republic.

The **Eighth** fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

The **Ninth** fold is a tribute to Womanhood and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The **Tenth** fold is a tribute to fathers, for he too has given his sons and daughters for the defense of their country since they were first born

The **Eleventh** fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrews eyes, the God of the Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.



The **Twelve** fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christians Eyes, God the Father, the Son of the Holy Spirit.

The **Thirteenth** fold or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding them of their nations motto, "In God We Trust"

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington and the Sailors and Marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for them the rights, privileges and freedom they enjoy today.





Another Great Battleship Story

When I got out of high school, I joined the Naval Reserve in Indianapolis. Where I worked, another friend joined the Marine Reserves. He was called up first and went thru boot camp, and the whole works. This was in late 1950. My reserve unit was drafted in January, 1951. Most of our draft were assigned to the Bon Homme Richard, Estes, and the New Jersey.

I ended up assigned to K Division, as a radarman. One evening, we were in the process of firing the 16 inch guns at targets in North Korea. During the mid watch, I was a telephone talker, taking spots from a spotter assigned to a Marine outfit, although at that time, I was not aware it was a Marine unit. For four hours we talked to each other.


At Christmas, 1951, I managed leave to return home to Indianapolis, and being young, I decided to wear my uniform to where I used to work. While there, I ran into my Marine friend. He noted the Korean ribbons on my uniform, and inquired as to when and where I was in Korea. I told him I was on the USS New Jersey, and he immediately said to me, "Onrush". This surprised me considerably since Onrush was our call sign while in Korea. Then he related about calling spots to Onrush for four hours at midnight to 4:00 a.m. This was the only time that he was a telephone talker during his time in Korea, and my only time to be taking spots from Korea.

It was an amazing situation, that here we were, buddies back home, and talking to each other for four hours, not knowing who was on the other end of the conversation. This is just one of those coincidences that happen in life, and I was happy to be a part of it. Incidentally, we didn't talk too much; our gunners were too good, and with only one spot, they were right on target. If I remember correctly, we shifted targets several times during that watch, and really pounded the North Koreans in that area.

Peter, I hope this isn't too long for what you might want, but it tells the story pretty well. I left Indianapolis in 1953, and lost track of all of my reserve friends from that era of my life. Really would like to get in touch with some of them.



ERA District Volunteer, APPOINTEES:

W.W.II, KOREA, VIETNAM, LEBANON / PERSIAN GULF;

NOTE: Selected on seniority volunteering, recommended by Liaison Officer to the President for appointment. 4 NORTHERN, 4 SOUTHERN, 4 EASTERN, 4 WESTERN: (States issued will vary by ex-crewmember, associate population) (Example: some may have 8 states and some may have 5 states, some may have 3 states) a. keep roster of USS New Jersey Vets. Inc. Member, Associate and Non -Vets. Inc, ex-crewmen in district. b. receive information from Era Representative Director, and pass same to members in his district, keeping in line, the policies of the USS New Jersey Vets. Inc. Member, Associate Members and the separation of non-members of the Corporation..

- c. shall not give out any information on the Corporation within reason (inner functions, financial) or the roster to anyone, or any group requesting same without authorization from Board of Directors.
- d. when someone wants to know or have contact with any member of the Corporation, whether a USS New Jersey Vets. Inc. member, associate member or non-member, remember our policy and the Privacy of Information Act. You shall inform the contacting person that his / her name, phone number, e-mail or address, will be given to the contacted for him / her to return the contact.
- e. shall relay all information about the hospitalization, death and problems of members, associates and non-member crewmen that need to be addressed to your ERA Representative who will pass the information to Board of Directors.
- f. shall not enter into any contract or financial dealings with any one, be they any persons, business or organizations.
- g. may be in direct contact with persons, organizations, requesting information about tours, sleepovers, re-enlistments, flags flown on ship etc. Have them contact the Home Port Alliance. Shall not give names, phone numbers, addresses or e-mail addresses provided by the Board of Directors. All media questions shall be relayed to Liaison Officer who will make determination of request and/or direct to proper Officer or Board Member.
- h. shall not get involved with any political situation and shall inform ERA Rep. of situation. Shall not make any statements to the Media.
- i. if anyone wants information to join organization, refer them to the Membership Chairman via Application to Join Form that is on the web site for downloading. Do not accept any money, checks or money orders made payable to the ship or the Corporation. Mail it back to the person or group in a larger envelope, recording such transaction and notify the Liaison Officer and Treasurer of such. Mail all membership applications that you receive with or without funds to the Membership Chairman or Treasurer depending on the situation.
- j. be discreet and courteous in all dealings with any member, associate member and non-member. Section 5.
