MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Greetings fellow shipmates,

Dues payments for 2025 came in very well last fall and we are now waiting for those members who still haven't sent in their 2025 dues.

When we find out about a shipmate that has passed away, I look in the cruise books and other sources to find out when they served, what division they were in and what their rating was when they were on New Jersey. To my surprise, I couldn't find anything out about a number of them. Sometimes we get lucky and can contact the family to find out more information about when they served.

Here's what I have learned:

World War II era

Finding out about our World War II shipmates is a real problem for a number of reasons:

- Many of our WWII veteran's obituaries never got posted on the internet.
- The World War II book didn't list very many junior officers and enlisted men. Fortunately, that was corrected in future cruise books.
- Their obituaries often just say "served in the Navy in the Pacific during WWII". There were so many famous ships in WWII that they just didn't mention which one their loved one was on. As New Jersey's fame grew after participating in the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Lebanon/Persian Gulf War, right up through 1991, their obituaries now will certainly note that our shipmate served on New Jersey. Ever notice that a WWII army veteran's obituary will say "Proudly served in the U.S. Army during WWII". But if they served in General George Patton's 3rd Army, they will note that.

Korean War Era

• It would appear that there was a big turnover of shipmates after the 1955 cruise and decommissioning in 1957 and the crew back then had very little documentation.

Vietnam War Era

• There was a big turnover of shipmates right after our return from Vietnam and through the announcement of decommissioning that never got well documented. By the time we marched off the ship in Bremerton on December 17th, only the names from that day were recorded.

If you know of any shipmates that came on board New Jersey after crossing the equator in 68 and didn't stay until decommissioning, please let me know so we can get them documented. I also noticed that some of our shipmates were promoted yet not recorded. Once again, please let me know so we can get them documented.

Lebanon and Persian Gulf War, right up through 1991

• This was the longest period of time that New Jersey was in commission and naturally has more gaps in documentation. If you know of anyone that didn't get recorded in any one of our cruise books, let one of our officers know.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This is our first edition of the Bounce with our new and revised management team installed. I look forward to working with this outstanding group of shipmates.

Accompanying this Report are the 2024 financials and I will try and provide a summary of the monetary results of last year. We began the year with \$39,739 in cash on hand. Net funds received during the year were \$67,919 and net funds disbursed were \$58,769.

Monies received were primarily from 2024 Reunion Registration Fees (52%), Scholarship Fund Receipts (15%), Membership Dues (15%), Ship Restoration Donations (10%), and Ship's Store Sales (8%)



Disbursements were mainly for *Reunion Expenses* (52%), *Ship Restoration Funds and Donation Payments* (19%) *Bounce Publication Expenses* (14%), *Ship's Store Expenses* (5%), and *Scholarship Awards* (5%).

We ended the year with \$48,889 in cash balances. Of that amount \$17,250 is committed to the Scholarship Fund.

Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin

The United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration was authorized by Congress, established under the secretary of defense and launched by the President in 2012. Its primary purpose, "to thank and honor Vietnam veterans and their families for their service and sacrifices".

Truly, we are proud partners with **The United States of America Vietnam War Commemoration** and are privileged to honor Vietnam veterans and their families.

We will be holding our last official Vietnam Veterans Commemoration Lapel Pin Ceremony at the reunion in September 2025.

The Vietnam Veteran Commemoration Recognition Committee as organized under the D.O.D. is coming to an end in March of this year, 2025. This was unexpected when announced late last year. Bob Dingman, as committee chairperson, and I, as committee member, were surprised.

Our National Commemoration honors everyone who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces from November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975. No distinction is being made between veterans who served in-country, in-theater, or who were stationed elsewhere during the Vietnam War period. All were called to serve, none could self-determine where they were stationed, and all were seen in the same way by a country that could not separate the war from the warrior. Each person who served during this period earned and rightly deserves our profound thanks.

If you served in the military anywhere from **November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975** and plan on attending our reunion in San Antonio TX, you are eligible to receive the **Vietnam Veterans Lapel Pin and Certificate**. Vietnam Veteran Lapel Pin

"A lasting memento of the Nation's thanks!"



Eligibility:

Presented to living U.S. veterans who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces at any time during the period of November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location, are eligible to receive one lapel pin.

Symbolism:

- Eagle The eagle represents courage, honor, and dedicated service to our Nation. As one of the most recognizable and notable American symbols, it is emblazoned on numerous military insignia.
- Blue Circle The color blue matches the canton of the American flag and signifies vigilance, perseverance, and justice.
- Laurel Wreath A time-honored symbol representing honor and victory.
- · Stripes The stripes behind the eagle represent the American flag.
- Stars The six stars represent the six allies who served, sacrificed, and fought alongside one another: the Commonwealth of Australia, the Kingdom of Thailand, New Zealand, the Republic of Korea and the Republic of the Philippines.
- Message "A Grateful Nation Thanks and Honors You" is embossed on the back, closest to the heart of the wearer. The official name of the Commemoration is included to remind each veteran that this is a national initiative.

State of the Museum Report

Shipmates,

As I write this in mid-February, we are almost through the winter slow season, although they are calling for another big snowstorm later this week. In March the museum has more than 50 guided group tours scheduled, the first month with that many since mid-2019. April and May already look busy too. While things are extremely lean around the museum right now, we are expecting high levels of visitation later this year, especially since the national celebrations of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the Navy and Marine Corps is happening across the river in Philadelphia this fall.

We have been preparing for the Navy and Marine Corps 250th celebrations for five years now. All our major restoration projects including replacing the teak deck, drydocking, and painting the freeboard have all been done with the intention that the ship will look her best and not need any major maintenance projects during the Fall 2025 celebrations or the summer 2026 national celebrations of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the country which will also take place in Philadelphia. We are expecting millions of tourists to be visiting our area and are dedicated to having the ship look her best while they are here.

The museum's most successful marketing has always been word of mouth, that is people excited about their visit posting about what they saw online. Having the ship look her best in 2025 and 2026 when we have increased visitation will help propel our visitation to new heights even after the celebrations are over and will help us fund the next set of projects the museum has to complete.



State of the Museum Report

Last year was incredibly successful for the restoration of the ship and while we don't want to start any major restoration projects over the next year, we are still looking for ways to continue improving the ship and make her more complete. To this end the Navy let us get on a couple of the mothballed ships at the Philadelphia Navy Yard, USS Whidby Island, USS Fort McHenry, USNS Grapple, and USNS Apache. We removed about 2-tons of equipment valued at \$250,000 from those ships but probably the most exciting thing we recovered were 4 MK26 soft mounts for .50cal machine guns. The museum has long had 2 on display at the bow but we wanted to add more. Navy History and Heritage Command shipped us seven demilitarized guns and we had an extra soft mount around so now we have guns on seven of the ship's eight .50cal positions. We just need to find one more \$2,600 soft mount to put in the last position. We will still have another gun left over for future use. The next piece we are looking for to display on the ship is one of the late 80s era Pioneer RPV's.

We are also looking for Marine artifacts for a new MARDET exhibit which will be in one of the MARDET berthing spaces at the aft end of Broadway. We have some great collections already and are always looking for more. For that matter, if you have any objects from your time on board the ship be sure to reach out. We would love to add them to the collection for possible inclusion in future exhibits.

Be sure to check the museum's website and various social media accounts for the most up to date information on the ship. We are still posting videos every night at 7pm Eastern on the YouTube channel, YouTube.com/BattleshipNewJersey.

Captain Snyder's Orderly (A first-person narrative as told to Wayne Benelow)

I felt very fortunate to be Captain Snyder's orderly for almost 2 years. Here is my story.

One day in late 1967, while we were in Philadelphia, one of the Chiefs in the 4th Division gathered all of the GMs and GM strikers together, saying that he needed two volunteers, one to be the Captain's orderly and one the XO's orderly. Since there were no Marines on board, and the orderly was required to carry a .45, a GM was the best bet. Although I knew better than to volunteer for anything, I was really tired of chipping paint and was willing to listen. The more I heard, the more I liked. When I asked if it involved chipping paint, and the answer I got was "no," I quickly volunteered as the Captain's orderly. When the Chief pointed at me, I knew I got the job. I was told to report to the Captain's cabin Monday morning, in dress blues.

With some trepidation, I reported to the Captain, and we discussed what my duties would be if I were to become his orderly. He explained that I was to follow him around and do what he told me to do. Both I and the Captain liked what we heard, and the Captain appointed me as his orderly - the beginning of an adventure. He pointed to a desk in his cabin and said, "That is your desk." It came equipped with a dial phone with many buttons, with which he or I could ring the office of anyone on the ship. He told me my first task was to get familiar with the ship, which I did. As we began to work together, after I once responded to him saying "Very good, sir," the Captain let me know, very quickly, that in the future, my response to any order he gave me was either, "Aye, aye, sir," or "Yes, sir." As his orderly, I wore a white garrison belt and white lanyard across my chest, attached to my belt, and my .45, and an ammunition pouch.

At first, I was very intimidated – he was the "Lord and master" and was old enough to be my father. He trained me in everything I needed to know. I quickly understood that the job required me to be at the Captain's beck and call. Besides getting tea from the steward assigned to the Captain's cabin (the Captain drank tea by the gallon), I had a myriad of other duties. For example, when the Captain wanted to summon one of the officers to his cabin, I would attempt to find that officer. Once I found, him, I would say, "The Captain sends his compliments and requests your presence in his cabin." Often, that invitation caused concern and trepidation on the part of the officer involved...!

One time I came to the Captain's cabin in dungarees that were a little wrinkled. The Captain told me that I represent him and from now on, I would deliver all of my uniforms to the laundry. It was great – I'd send my uniforms down, and later find them clean, folded, and laying on my bunk. Another time, when I left his cabin for chow, he felt it took me too long to finish and asked me why. I told him that the chow line was very long. He told me, "You're my orderly; you don't stand in line...!" So, from then on, I would go to the head of the line. I'm not sure what my petty officer shipmates thought of that...

We all recall steaming through the Panama Canal and arriving at our homeport of Long Beach. We continued to train, most especially firing the main battery at San Clemente Island for the first time since the ship was commissioned. It was decided that turret two would be the first to fire. I was on the bridge with the Captain. He was asked whether he wanted the bridge windows up or down. Some discussion followed, the Captain saying, "I don't know; roll them down." So, we rolled them down. When they turret fired, it knocked my hat off, and heavy smoke came into the bridge, causing coughing and sputtering by all on the bridge. The Captain immediately ordered the windows rolled up...!

The ship departed Long Beach on 2 September 1968, sailing later from Subic Bay on 25 September. We arrived off Da Nang on 30 September 1968. Less than one month later, on 26 October, we were attacked by North Vietnam. Thought at first to be dolphins in the water, it was quickly clear that the ship was being bracketed, by, what we found out later, were 155-millimeter shells. The ship came up to speed, unmasked its main battery and fired multiple nine-gun salvos. I remember being on the bridge with the Captain at the time, hearing a spotter exclaim that half of Tiger Island had just fallen into the Gulf of Tonkin...! The Captain encouraged me to look through the "big eyes" on the bridge and see the result of our destruction on the island...it was extensive. I was then ordered to summon the two officers who were on watch in the gun directors at the time of the attack -Ensigns Migrala and Greenleaf - to the Captain's cabin. When they arrived there, the Captain asked how close the fall of shot was to the ship. They answered it was between 25 and 50 yards. The Captain then thought for a minute, and said, "Those rounds didn't come any closer than 500 yards. Do you understand that? 500 yards." They understood...! The Captain wanted to ensure that neither the families of the crew, nor the public, were aware the rounds came as close as they did.

An event that I recall well was the crossing of the equator, on 15 December, and the transformation of a large percentage of the crew - those who weren't already Shellbacks - from pollywogs to Shellbacks, members of the Ancient Order of the Deep. A great day was had by all. I was especially happy about a member of my former division, the 4th Division, becoming Miss New Jersey in King Neptune's Court's beauty contest. Characteristic of Captain Snyder and his love for the New Jersey, at the end of a long day of Shellbacks' high jinks, still in his dress (choker) whites, he was seen personally cleaning some of the debris from the ship's gunwales with his bare hands.

And he loved the crew as much as he loved the ship. Though on most ships, junior officers are assigned to sample the crew's mess, Captain Snyder felt it important enough to take on that duty himself, and he visited the mess decks regularly.

And we all know about the events of 25 December 1968... Bob, Hope, Ann-Margaret, Rosie Grier, Les Brown and his band, and the Golddiggers came aboard to entertain us for Christmas. What a great event. We were fully entertained, despite Bob Hope's being ill during the whole performance. Being with the Captain, I got to shake hands with Bob Hope and actually kiss Ann-Margaret (on the lips...!). Because he was feeling ill, Bob Hope remained on the ship overnight, in the admiral's cabin.

It was very common for very senior officers - admirals and generals - to visit the ship and be awed by its size and firepower. The Captain would greet these visitors, representing many countries in addition to ours, and I would be designated the duty tour guide, since the Captain often wasn't up to it. We toured medical spaces, the mess decks, Broadway, and a turret, among other tourist attractions... The Captain once admonished me to be less nervous around these officers, but it was often intimidating to be touring such senior officers around the ship.

Helicopter pilots loved to come aboard for a number of reasons, including the hot meals they got to eat, sometimes in the Captain's cabin.... And they were welcome, except for the cowboy who landed his copter on the helo deck late on a Sunday afternoon. With no helo detail in place and many crew members lounging on the fantail, the result was to put lives in danger and send many cards and letters and magazines over the side. Using some choice words, the Captain ordered the helo detail set immediately, then, in no uncertain terms, ordered him off our ship. The Captain was just as direct in telling the pilot's boss to "keep that &*%\$^&# guy off my ship."

I have heard it said that the story of the Captain having a pool on board was a myth. But all of us know that not only was there a pool in the forward, port gun tub, but the Captain enjoyed a swim in it on a hot Vietnam afternoon.

The Captain often invited Marines and soldiers to leave the jungle for a few hours and come aboard for a hot meal. I often saw them disembark from helos, still with camouflage on their faces and helmets on their heads, some of whom actually kissing the helo deck, feeling very safe, at least for a few hours. Some of them were able even to sleep overnight on the ship. At one point, the Captain was presented with an AK-47 and a piece of shrapnel from one of our 16-inch rounds. It was about 3 to 4 feet long and was extremely heavy. One of those Marines who came aboard characterized the damage from a main battery shell looking like "the result of 1000 lawnmowers, chopping down trees and bush."

After our being on the gunline since September of 1968, in April 1969, we headed East. Homeward bound...! Then, on April 15, the North Koreans shot down an unarmed Navy EC-121 over the Sea of Japan. So, after steaming 6,000 miles of our 8,000 voyage, I watched the Captain order the OOD to reverse course and head, as we later found out, back to the western Pacific. As we came about, many of us watched the carrier group we were accompanying continue on their journey eastward, homebound. It certainly was extremely disappointing to the whole crew, but thankfully we were able to resume our journey east a few weeks later.

Despite my being only his orderly, the captain was always very good to both me, and, when we were in port, his driver. He was great to work for. Once, when we were still in Philadelphia, the Captain was invited to the Governor's mansion, where the Governor presented the Captain with the New Jersey's silver service. In a typically thoughtful move, he brought his driver and me to the reception with him, and we were honored to meet the Governor. Similarly, later, upon our arrival in Pearl Harbor, the Captain brought his driver and me to the Admiral's reception. Great food...!

We finally arrived back in Long Beach. The Captain was heading to his next duty station. He told me that he was going to be promoted to Rear Admiral, and he wanted me to come along with him and stay on his staff. Despite my tremendous respect for him, and the fact that I didn't have a bad day in all the time I worked for Captain Snyder, it was time for me to leave the Navy, so I was forced to decline his very humbling offer.

It was truly my privilege to serve the Captain as his orderly for almost two years.

And that's my story...!

Another letter I uncovered was a son aboard the ship to his father on the same launching invitation where the son signed the invitation. 

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San Antonio



San Antonio is situated at the headwaters of the San Antonio River on the Balcones Escarpment. Spanish explorers first visited the site, then a camp of the Payaya Indians, in 1691. San Antonio was founded May 1, 1718, when a expedition Spanish from Mexico established the Mission San Antonio de Valero. The mission, later called the Alamo (Spanish for "Cottonwood"), was one of five founded in the area and was named for Saint Anthony of Padua. On May 5 a presidio (military garrison) known as San Antonio de Béxar was

established nearby. The site, on the river's west bank, was a stopping place on the trail through the Texas wilderness between missions on the Rio Grande and those in East Texas.


In 1731 settlers from the Canary Islands laid out the town of San Fernando de Béxar near the presidio, where a civilian community had been planned when the presidio and mission were established. During its early years the settlement suffered from frequent raids by Apache and Comanche tribes. San Fernando de Béxar functioned as provincial capital from 1773 to 1824, but in subsequent years its political authority waned. By 1837, when it became a county seat in the Republic of Texas, it had been renamed San Antonio.

At the time of Mexican independence in 1821, San Antonio was, along with Goliad and Nacogdoches, one of three established Spanish communities in Texas. In the summer of that year Stephen Austin arrived in the city – then seat of the Spanish government in Texas – to follow through on a permit obtained by his father for the admission of 300 U.S. families into the territory. In December 1835, at the outset of the Texas Revolution, Texan forces occupied the Alamo. They remained there until March 1836, when they were massacred by Mexican troops under Gen. Antonio López de Santa Anna following a 13-day siege. The presidio ceased to exist with the independence of Texas in April.

In 1836 San Antonio was still the foremost city of Texas, with some 2,500 inhabitants. It grew rapidly after independence, led by large numbers of German immigrants. During the last decades of the 19th century, San Antonio, as the starting point for the Chisholm Trail, became a major cattle center, where herds were assembled for the overland drives to the railheads in Kansas.

The city quickly became the commercial hub of the Southwest. The arrival of the first railroad in 1877 brought migrants from the American South, and Mexican immigrants settled there after the start of the Mexican Revolution in 1910. San Antonio was a major military center during World Wars I and II, a factor that continued to dominate its economy in subsequent decades. In 1968 a world's exposition, known as HemisFair, was

held there to commemorate the city's 250th anniversary and to celebrate its cultural ties with Latin America.



The National Museum of the Pacific War located in Fredericksburg, Texas, is the boyhood home of Fleet Admiral Chester W Nimitz. Admiral Nimitz served as Commander in Chief, United States Pacific Fleet and was then named Commander in Chief, Pacific Ocean during World War II.

The Museum shows what it was like to battle in the Pacific Islands replicating numerous aspects of the terrain, trenches and fortified cave positions that the

Japanese had created to battle US Forces on the Pacific Islands. Presentations at the

Pacific Combat Zone include weapons and vehicles used during the Island-Hopping campaign that allied forces mounted.

The Children's Exhibit depicts World War II on the home front in the United States through the eyes of children. In the exhibit, visitors have opportunities to ponder not only the sacrifices made by children on the home front during the war but also their resilience. Featuring three vignettes - a rural scene, a city scene,



and one of an internment camp- visitors get a glimpse of growing up under the cloud of war and a variety of interactive opportunities. The vignettes vary from a cotton farm in Texas to a street in south Chicago, to an internment camp in Wyoming for Japanese Americans. Within each setting, visitors will get a sense of what American children faced on the home front by encountering a virtual child, which serves as an introduction to the space.

The Iwo Jima exhibit tells the story behind the iconic photo of the flag-raising on Mt. Suribachi, learn about the significance of capturing that volcanic mass and the unique challenges of the horrific 36-day battle. The exhibit includes an M2-2 flamethrower, a weapon instrumental in our Iwo Jima victory.



The Japanese Garden of Peace is a gift from the people of Japan to the people of the United States and symbolizes the friendship between these two countries. Completed in 1976, the Garden celebrates the mutual respect between two great naval heroes: Japanese Admiral Heihachiro Togo and American

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz. The garden displays not only symbols and traditional values common in Japanese gardens but also contains unique elements that embody the Pacific Ocean and the themes of the Museum.

The Pearl Harbor exhibit tells the story of the attack on Pearl Harbor and how it brought our nation into the war.


